

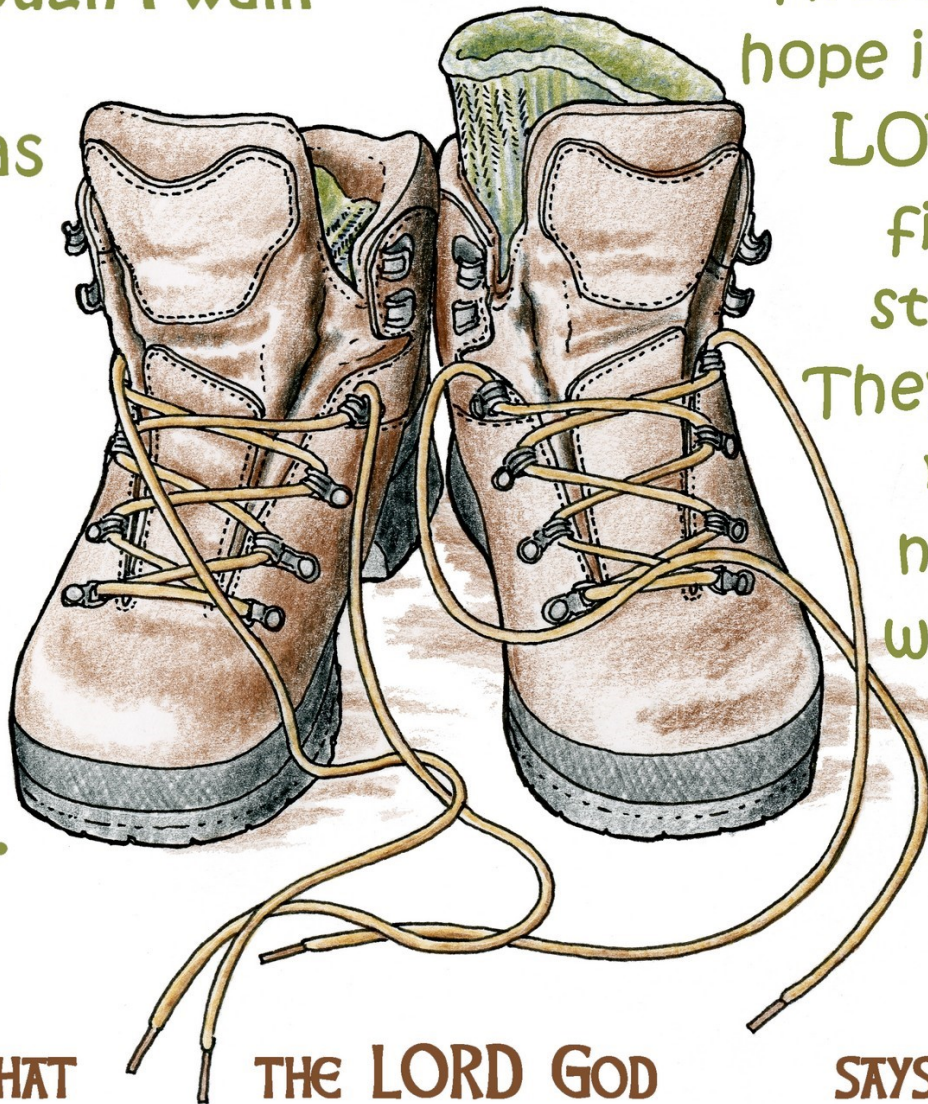

Thoughts from the vicarage – September 2022

September is here and we look forward once again to enjoying the colours of autumn all around us, the fruit trees heavy with fruit in our orchards and gardens, the leaves and seeds falling to the ground, perhaps walks through woods with the crispness underfoot that we associate with the season, the 'seedtime and the harvest' being sung about again in our churches and schools, and all being well as we recognise the familiarity of the turning of the seasons.



But the recent heat wave and drought in parts of Britain and also in significant areas of the globe have meant that the browned dry grassland and fields, hedges and verges have been with us for quite some time, with wildfires breaking out across both field and forest. The seasons seem less defined, the wildlife less prevalent, and the lives we live just a little more precarious perhaps.

What are we doing to our world and what are we doing to mitigate disaster?

The Millennium Seed Bank at the Royal Botanical Gardens, Kew suggests that two in five plant species are in danger of extinction – not just from this year's drought or fire but as a consequence of our failure to look after our world with respect and the devastating changes to the climate that are happening as a result. The Millennium Seed Project is collecting seeds from as many species across the UK and the world as it can. It will keep them at sub-zero temperatures in specially designed underground flood, bomb and radiation-proof vaults. They currently have over 2.4 billion seeds - and counting! A 'Noah's Ark' of seeds for the future, should we need it.

Seeds are the precious treasure-chests of life. They provide the food we eat as grain for bread, and crops of all kinds. They provide flowers and shrubs for our pleasure. They grow into trees for the cleansing and replenishing of the air we breathe. In so many ways they sustain life.

Julian of Norwich, the 14th Century Mystic and anchoress, in one of her many visions found herself holding a hazelnut in her hand, as miniscule in God's eye as a tiny round ball floating in space, and she asked God what it was, and the reply came *'it is all that is made.....and God loves it'*.

The seed is so important for the future of our world, so important for our survival, so important to God that we should be mindful to make sure that we do our best to protect and preserve it.

This autumn perhaps we could find the space and time to reflect on the precariousness of our ecosystems, to think about how we use the world's resources and to make the changes needed in our own lives to preserve our world. Perhaps also, we could sow, plant or grow something new for God and for the future of our world.

St David's Cathedral Pembrokeshire

I have wanted to visit St David's Cathedral for quite a while and this year we had the chance to go.

I always thought of St David's built on a hill but taken aback to find it in a valley with the Bell tower on the hill top.

St David founded a 6th Century monastery and trained Missionaries to spread Christianity to Ireland. The present Cathedral was started in 1180 by the Norman Bishop Peter de Leia. The shrine to St David was a pilgrimage site and people travelled from Europe as well as Britain to visit. The Shrine was lost during the Viking raid and rebuilt in 1275, but was later removed during the Reformation by Bishop Barlow in the sixteenth century.



David was born in Wales and his Mother was St Non who came from the area. Many myths and stories were told about St David but his last Message to his followers was.

Be Joyful and keep the faith, do the little things you have seen me do.

His faith was a simple one of caring for all people. He did not eat meat just vegetables and water.

The Cathedral was rebuilt several times and added to, one unique feature is the sloping Nave .

There is a shrine to St David again now when work was carried out inside they found one of the original walls behind the altar and reinstated the shrine to St David.

The building has Romanesque features and the same masons who built Wells Cathedral could have been used as there are similarities. Gilbert Scott carried out restoration work in the Victorian period.

There is a memorial to the first Tudor, Edmund Tudor father of Henry VII which was moved from Carmarthen when Henry VIII dissolved the monasteries. The oak ceilings were added from 1472 made from Irish Oak.

There are ruins of the Bishop's Palace next to the Cathedral now in a state of disrepair. They were built by Bishop Gower in 1340 and represents a different side of early Christian life where he entertained rich and influential people who arrived on a pilgrimage to the Cathedral. This was so different from St David's life style and actions.

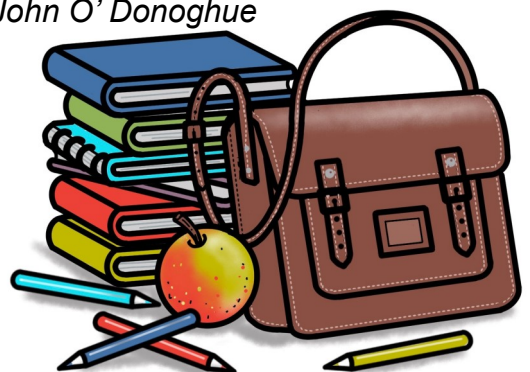

To all those who have knitted squares for 'Brighter Futures'. They have asked if we would now do Twiddle Muffs. Please see pattern below.



Twiddle Muff Pattern

A Twiddle muff is a double thickness hand muff with ribbons, buttons and knitted features attached to the inside and out. It is designed for patients suffering from dementia as it provides stimulation activity.

What you need:

- Wool – approx. one 150 gram ball will probably be enough – it varies a great deal depending on the individual wool.
- 1 Pair of needles (size depends on the type of wool you want to use).
- A tapestry needle for sewing up.
- Oddments of yarn, ribbon, trimmings, buttons, beads etc. for embellishment.

Getting started:

This pattern can be knitted in any wool but you will need to adjust the number of stitches you cast on depending on the size of the needle and the type of wool used. Look on the ball band, if there is one, of the wool for information about needle size and tension. Because of the simple nature of the pattern the measurements do not have to be exact and you can easily test them out on your own hands!

Double knit wool on size 5-7 needles comes out at about 5 to 5.5 stiches per inch.
Chunky wool on size 7-9 needles comes out at about 4 to 5 stiches per inch.

The width of the Twiddle Muff needs to be about 12 to 13 inches wide (this is the length of the muff – so you can check against your own hands to see if you have made this the right size).

The length of your knitting needs to be twice the width (60 cm)24 inches long(30 cm)12 inches wide

To begin:

In a lighter wool cast on 60 stitches, or the number of stitches to give you about 30cm width. In chunky wool cast on 48 stitches.

Keep knitting until you reach about 24 inches / 60 cm or double the width the cast off. Or try stocking stitch – one row knit, the next row purl for a smooth finish.

Step 1

Decorate the Twiddle Muff on the right side of the knitting. Leave a small area halfway down (in the middle) that is free of decoration.

Step 2

Fold along the middle, with the decoration showing on both sides and then sew up the three open edges. Now you have double thickness.

Step 3

Now sew the cast on / cast off edge to the middle fold edge together to make a tube that has double thickness and is decorated inside and out.

Step 4

Now wash the Twiddle Muff at 30 degrees in the washing machine and let dry (do not use a tumble dryer). Once dry bag up and send them in to:

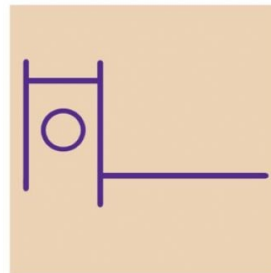
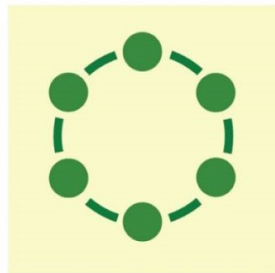
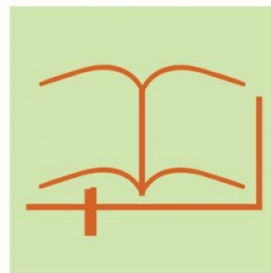
You may be aware that many charities and organisations are struggling at this time, this includes churches.
